



The Minamata convention is regulating the formal trade and use of mercury. But little information is available on the formal and especially informal pathways of mercury and how these drive the artisanal gold economies. From its original source to the gold mining sites at the other end of the world, trade routes of informally traded mercury remain largely elusive to this day.

- Where does mercury originate from?
- How is it transported and by whom?
- Through which formal and informal channels?
- Who benefits most from the mercury trade?
- Which systems are constraining mercury free artisanal gold?

Based on local accounts, a report by IUCN NL discloses new insights on informal mercury flows, trade hubs and key players in Bolivia, Burkina Faso, Guyana, Kenya, Philippines, Suriname, Tanzania and Uganda.
